Pike Honored At ECU Game

DMAA's Distinguished President Emeritus Lamar "Skippy" Reynolds, in a pregame ceremony was recognized as the "Fan of the Game" at the USM-ECU football game. In his wheelchair it was Skippy's honor to meet with and present to official game ball to the referees out at the 50-yard line.

Since that time Skippy has spent time in the hospital dealing with a 600+-level blood sugar and his Multiple Sclerosis. It is now believed he is about to enter a therapy regiment.

Awards Ceremony

Back in July, 2012, Brother Skippy Reynolds was nominated for several initial posts with the infant Delta Mu Alumni Association, but due to health complications was unable to accept those nominations. So, the membership attending the founding meeting voted unanimously to create an honor on behalf of Skippy and voted to create the "Distinguished President Emeritus" position expressly for this beloved Brother..

At Homecoming and the Pike Open House, that award will be presented to Skippy. If he's unable to attend, it will be taken to his home and presented.

Also at the Homecoming awards ceremony, the Delta Mu Chapter will be presented a copy of something most of you have never seen. That being a framed copy of the long-lost original 1949 Chapter Charter to be hung in the Alumni Room.

A plaque denoting that in 1967, the Pike House was formally dedicated to our beloved "Mom" Bonnie Gibson will be affixed to the lobby wall.

The original charter plaque of the Delta Mu Alumni Association will also be presented and hung in the Alumni Room beside the 1949 Chapter Charter.

And, a large 11 X 14 coffee table book dating from the 1949 Charter through 1965 containing chapter class composites, activities and news photo's, plus narratives and first-hand stories from those infamous legends of our time. A copy of this book is permanently enshrined in the USM Archives.

Here's A Surprise To Some



Yes, Winky, there were two mascot PiKA firetrucks, not one. Fire Chief, Ed Allbritton would tell you this was a 1927 American La France 100 foot hook and ladder he found stored under a building at the Jackson (MS) city dump and the Chapter acquired from the City of Jackson for \$100.

On a rainy, cold day, it was hooked behind a tractor-trailer unit belonging to a now defunct Hattiesburg motor-common-carrier with Ed on the firetruck wheel and was towed down in front of the old Pike House. Ed and passenger Brother Steve Pocari were soaked and almost suffering hypothermia when they arrived.

This is the mascot's first and last official appearance, the 1959 Homecoming Parade.

And, that's this writer topside of the ladder unit playing with the crowd by swinging the trailing ladders out over their heads.

Coming back to campus, we were catching some static from a carload of KA's and having independent control of the ladder unit, while the engine was in the right lane of HWY 49, I put the ladder unit in the left lane of the highway. Thus, we had some irrate KA's on our hand by the time we reached Hardy Street.

In the Spring of 1960, Ed and I were taking the truck to be repainted. There was a slight grade and a stop sign on the route.

Ed decided to not come to a complete stop at the sign.

Too late. The old mechanical brakes would not stop that big hunk of iron in time to not make right, broadside of a brown Chevrolet Impala approaching from our left.

Impact broke the old brittle steering mechanisms and turned the power unit in a tight right turn. Houston, there's a problem.

There were two telephone poles between which I had to take the ladder unit. See, the ladder unit must go left first if the power unit goes right. As I'm cranking on the ladder unit steering wheel, I can see two things: Ed fighting a steering wheel that does absolutely nothing and an old lady, eyes the size of dinner plates, sitting on her front porch as this big red, noisy contraption heads straight for her front screen porch door and up two steps before the engine, now scrap iron, died and we rolled back off her steps.
