



Discovered in Texas, towed back to the Mack Truck Dealership owned by Brother Bob Allen's father, Mr. W.H. Allen, rebuilt, painted and donated to Delta Mu, this 1939 American LaFrance pumper is pictured outside the then new PIKE House.

On March 19, 1969 the Chapter voted to initiate Mr. W.H. Allen by Special Dispensation and to rescind Brother Bob Allen's dues for the remainder of his college career.

HALL OF FAME NOMINEE BIOGRAPHIES

Last month, you received the biographies of 5 of the 7 Delta Mu Hall of Fame nominees. Here are the remaining two Alumni you have nominated to be voted on at the July 19 and 20 SECOND ANNUAL MEETING in Hattiesburg. They are: Vic Purvis and Dr. Jerry Reel.

VIC PURVIS: The headlines read "Vic Purvis To Be Inducted in Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame" and goes on to say, "Hattiesburg, Miss.-Former Southern Miss standout Vic Purvis was one of six people selected to be enshrined in the Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame class of 2006, the Jackson Touchdown Club, Inc., the Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame, Inc., and the Mississippi Sports Foundation, Inc., announced today."

Vic Purvis, born November 17, 1943, created a national sensation in 1965 with back-to-back 200 yard rushing games for Southern Miss. The Southern Miss quarterback moved ahead of Southern Cal running back Mike Garrett as the nation's leading rusher. Garrett would later take the rushing lead back and eventually become the Heisman Trophy winner.

Raised in the Puckett and Morton areas, in high school, he earned 14 letters in football, basketball, baseball and track. He paced his high school football team to a 22-6-3 record and in 1961 played in the Mississippi High School All-Star Football game as a quarterback and as a defensive back. In 1961, as a Senior at Puckett High, Purvis was named Most Valuable Back in the Capital Athletic Conference.

He received a scholarship to play for the run-oriented Coach Thad "Pie" Vann in 1961, played sparingly, was redshirted in 1962 and took over as starting QB in 1963 where he was the team's second leading rusher, then led the team in rushing in '64 and '65, his Senior year. Only one QB, Don Fuell, has ever lead the team in rushing in Southern Miss history. Overall, under his leadership, Southern Miss was 18-8-1.

His 238 yards rushing against Memphis established a new quarterback national rushing record which remained unbroken until Kansas QB Nolan Cromwell toppled the mark 10 years later. But, no NCAA quarterback has ever matched Purvis' record of consecutive 200 yard games.

His off-the-field accomplishments at Mississippi Southern, he was named Honorable Mention All-American and Academic All-American for the two years running, USM Hall of Fame and was elected Mr. USM. Likewise, he was a Dean's List Scholar, a President's List Scholar, a member of "Who's Who in American Colleges", a member of ODK, Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity and a member of the Student Court.

Signed to a Free Agent contract in 1965 by the Boston Patriots (now the New England Patriots), he made the team as a punt returner and defensive back, appearing in 16 games in the 1966 and 1967 seasons until a severe shoulder injury that ended his pro career.

In 1972, in his first year of eligibility, he was inducted into the Southern Miss Sports Hall of Fame.

Starting with much revered Statewide play-by-play football broadcaster and Mississippi Hall of Fame Member, Bill (Woo-Hoo, Mercy) Goodrich Vic started broadcasting Southern Miss football in 1974, commuting to games from his home in the Cincinnati area. Having now broadcast over 450 USM games, Vic has been the "Color Man", translating the complexities of the game in a language easily understood by serious ex-football players and casual fans or listeners alike.

In his almost 40 years of broadcasting USM games, Vic has been behind the microphone for the present consecutive string of 20 games in a row, one of the longest stints as an analyst of college football in the nation. In 2013, he enters the radio booth for his 40th season working with the longtime legendary voice of the Golden Eagles, John Cox.

As Vic explains, "You know on the Southern Miss Football radio broadcasts, there's John Cox, the Voice of the Golden Eagles and that other guy. I'm the "other guy".

HALL OF FAME BIOGRAPHIES - PAGE 2

DR. JEROME V. REEL Most know former Delta Mu SMC as "Jerry Reel", Pi Kappa Alpha International Historian, author of the nationally distributed Pi Kappa Alpha Book, "The Oak", celebrated lecturer and former Delta Mu SMC.

Jerry was born in New Orleans in 1937. Was educated at Fortier High School there. Attending Tulane University, he studied Architecture and on March 1, 1957 was initiated into the Eta Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha before transferring to then Mississippi Southern College and becoming an active member of the Delta Mu Chapter there.

In 1959, he was the Chapter Inter-Fraternity Council representative and was elected SMC to head Delta Mu.

Jerry graduated in 1960 with a Bachelor of Science degree in History and English and went on to attain a Master's in Mississippi History in 1961 and married his LSU Chi Omega sweetheart, Edmee that same year.

While teaching at Clemson University (1963-2013), entered Emory University's PhD program to study British Midievil History, earning his doctorate in 1967.

At Clemson University, Jerry served as Professor of History and was named Alumni Master Teacher of the Year in 1975.

He was the Founding Faculty Advisor for the Tulane Eta Advisor from 1972 through 1990 during which time the Eta Chapter won 13 Smythe Awards. Served as National Vice President, Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity, from 1972 until 1974; National President from 1974 until 1976. In 1976, the Pi Kappa Alpha Supreme Council requested Jerry assume the job of what was then known as the "National Historian", since renamed the "International Historian".

Appointed and accepted in 1976, International Historian, Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity, is the exalted position an Dr. Jerry Reel still maintains.

He has authored Two Hundred Years of Freedom and Fraternity; The Oak; A History of Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity; Integration with Dignity (the story of Clemson's quiet racial integration in 1963); Women and Clemson; The High Seminary, 1884-1964; A History of Clemson Agricultural College (Volumes 1 & 2); A History of Clemson University 1964-2000; A Biography of Thomas Green Clemson; An Index To The Biographies of Englishmen, 1000-1485 and some 10 scholarly articles, and about 100 book reviews.

He was made an "Honorary Alumnus of Clemson University" in the year 2000.; received the Governor's Award for "Contributions To The Humanities" and was a member of "lots" of academic organizations, among them Phi Alpha Theta and Phi Kappa Phi.

Jerry served as the Dean of Undergraduate Studies at Clemson University of 25 years.

Had two "Little Brothers" at Tulane's Eta Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha and eight (8) at Southern Miss' Delta Mu Chapter.

He and Edmee have three children. One son, a PIKE. One daughter, an Alpha Delta Pi and a second daughter to whom it is loving tradition by us Delta Mu'ers to refer to as a "GDI".
